### From the Rector

Dear Friends,

I've been thinking about how kings and queens have been depicted in portraiture. No matter the artist—Holbein, Van Dyck, Rigaud—they were always depicted as either remote or idealized. Annigoni's famous portrait of Queen Elizabeth II is a case in point: the National Portrait Gallery described it as showing Queen Elizabeth "In a sylvan idyll yet outward looking and connected to her surroundings." Yet the portrait was also

criticized for emphasizing Elizabeth the monarch while showing little insight into Elizabeth the person.

In 2007 Annie Leibovitz took a number of photographs of the Queen. In one she is in a gold gown with a luxurious fur draped over her arm, and in another she is depicted—as she is in Annigoni's work—in the robes of the Order of the Garter. These beautiful photographs have been circulating widely online since Queen Elizabeth's death.

But even more beautiful are Leibovitz's photographs from 2014. They show a very different kind of monarch: human and humble, in country tweeds and in comfortable surroundings. The best one of all shows Queen Elizabeth and the Princess Royal sitting lovingly close together on sofa just like any other mother and daughter.

And then there's the last official photograph, taken a mere 48 hours before her death. She is frail, stopped, holding a walking stick. But she is smiling broadly—dare I say beatifically? —looking like any other grandmother.

I am not the first to note that over the past few years, Queen Elizabeth's Christmas broadcasts more and more emphasized her Christian faith. It's almost as if as the Elizabeth depicted in official pictures became less magisterial and more maternal, the one speaking to us on television became more Christ-like. That's no exaggeration. She expressed to us something she always knew but seldom talked about: her reign was overshadowed by—and reflective of—the reign of Christ. Despite the grand trappings of monarchy underneath it all

was a humble woman who was deeply aware of how she was that though she reigned, she didn't rule since. She well understood her Lord's saying "I am among you as one who serves."

Each of us has a persona behind which there is the real person and we're afraid of letting showing our true self for fear of losing face. I daresay for a long time, Queen Elizabeth believed the same. Yet as she became more human, more relaxed, more herself it was quite the opposite. She became even more beloved, precious, and irreplaceable. All of which leads me to wonder how I'd be depicted in an official portrait. How would you?
