Dear Friends,

A friend in Calgary sent me a photo earlier this week which he'd taken from the window of his 39th story apartment. It was a familiar Calgary scene showing a calamitous, city-stopping whiteout. I could hardly see the downtown streets in the photo. So, because I'm a "good" friend, I sent him a picture of the back garden of the rectory in all its unseasonable, autumnal glory.

The weather has been amazing. But it won't last. In fact, I just got a text from the friend I'm having dinner with in Toronto tomorrow bemoaning the fact that it's going rain - or at least be very gloomy. Well - who cares? It's not like our plan was to dine al fresco.

Isn't it funny that you and I are so easily drawn into being negative and gloomy? We've had an unseasonably warm autumn and instead of celebrating that fact, my friend is focusing on rain. Instead of being grateful for the amazing (and unexpected) gift of these glorious and golden days, he's feeling downcast.

As Christians, we have so much to celebrate and yet too often we are dragged down by a spirit of defeat and resignation. We let the disappointment of the present time make us forget just how good we've had it - and that good and beautiful times will come again. Rainy days don't last forever. Neither will this present time of ecclesiastical statis.

The leaves which were so glorious but which are now dead on the ground will become part of a larger ecosystem; what has happened to them is a necessary part of a natural cycle. The trick is for you and me to not lose heart and hope. To say with confidence as the psalmist did, "Weeping may spend the night, but joy comes in the morning."

For me, that joy is known each and every Sunday when I celebrate the Eucharist for and with you - the greatest possible privilege. And even though that silver cup contains the blood of Christ, it's also is a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. It's fuel for the journey. It's the promise that better things are yet to come.






