### From the Rector

Dear Friends,

For the last couple of weeks I have enjoyed rediscovering the music of the twentieth century English composer Gerald Finzi. He is best known in Anglican circles for two choral anthems: Lo, the Full, Final Sacrifice and God Is Gone Up. But it isn't through Anglican choral music that I first encountered him when I was in high school. It was through his Cello Concerto. It's a true masterpiece—maybe not quite on the level of

his fellow countryman Edward Elgar's concerto for the same instrument, but a masterpiece nonetheless. The second movement is emblematic of much of Finzi's work: limpidly beautiful, yearning, and even melancholic.

The other day I listened to a piece of his called *The Fall of the Leaf*. It's quintessential Finzi: poignant, lyrical, achingly beautiful. It somehow conveys the feeling many of us have at this time of year. While there's sadness that while summer and all the carefree feelings it brings is gone, autumn brings a quiet warmth and a beauty all the more dear because it's so fleeting.

The recent autumn days have been glorious; our Thanksgiving weekend was picture perfect. To paraphrase the late Frederick Buechner, the days all but broke the heart with their beauty. It's a beauty that quickly fades, what with the falling leaves and shortening days. These natural changes make us think about all of the changes we have seen in our own lives, the losses we've seen and experienced, and even the sense that our own days are drawing in.

But instead of feeling melancholic that the fall of the leaf signifies the end of summer, perhaps we should be thankful that autumn gives us time to stop and reflect as the American poet Mary Oliver did when she asked, "Doesn't everything die at last, and too soon?
Tell me, what is it you plan to do

with your one wild and precious life?"


