## **From the Rector**



#### Dear Friends:

This past Monday—April 25—was St Mark's Day. His gospel is the earliest written. It's also the shortest and it ends abruptly, in medias res. "So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid." What a strange way to end a story of the good news! Did Mark mean it to end like this? Was a page somehow lost? Or, since he was writing during the first persecution of Christians, did he have to suddenly get up from his writing table and flee for his life? Whatever happened, his gospel

doesn't have an end in the traditional sense and that says something important to you and me.

It says that we must learn to live with ambiguity, and that's unsettling. We often talk about "needing closure": some definitive, unmistakable line drawn under this event or the other. And there's no doubt that when it comes to all kinds of normal human situations, closure is important. But there's nothing particularly normal—or human!—about the resurrection.

An ancient writer tried to give closure to Mark's gospel, mind you, adding several verses describing Christ's appearance to the Apostles, his sending them out into the world, and his Ascension. Clearly, he was as uncomfortable as we are with loose ends.

But a loose end is also something that simply hasn't been tied off, a thread that is still to be woven into a larger pattern. Loose ends mean that there are new patterns, new possibilities yet to come. Life, even resurrection life, is open ended: still happening, still blooming, still being woven.

Of course, Easter faith tells us that there is an ending which will be in the New Jerusalem and the Supper of the Lamb. But that ending of course will be just the beginning—the beginning of the new life in Christ which will never end.

PWRDF is <u>supporting Ukrainians forced</u> <u>to flee their homes</u> due to the Russian invasion. The initial grant of \$20,000 issued to an ACT Alliance appeal has been increased to \$50,000. The grants will fund the work of Action by Churches Together (ACT) member Hungarian Interchurch Aid (HIA).

As the war began on February 24, tens of thousands of Ukrainians fled for safety elsewhere in Ukraine or to neighbouring countries. Yelena was one of hundreds of Ukrainians in line at a border crossing into Hungary, waiting with her three children while her husband is on the frontlines. She told ACT, "We heard that the Polish border is completely jammed, so we decided to cross the mountains and try to make it into Hungary. My sister is still on the way, I have no idea where she or my nieces are."

On February 27, HIA set up a 24-hour refugee support point on the Hungarian side of the border at Beregsurány, where the line of refugees trying to cross into Hungary is kilometres long, says an ACT communiqué. HIA is providing hot tea, sandwiches, refreshments, blankets and basic hygiene items for Ukrainians, including many elderly and children who are waiting long hours to cross the border into Hungary.

"We've been standing here at this border checkpoint for more than five hours," says Yelena. "It is cold and my children are freezing. It is amazing to see that people are here to help, and even just talking to you gives us hope for a better future."
