From the Rector

One of the great Advent hymns begins with an arresting imperative: "Wake, awake, for night is flying." It's an image drawn from the end of Matthew's gospel in which Jesus says, "Keep awake therefore, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming."

Now the idea of keeping awake is innocuous enough and is even something we all do from time to time. But we can't be perpetually wakeful; sleep is essential for good health—even though we

don't really know why. But we *do* know that a lack of sleep leads to all sorts of physical and cognitive problems and that if being unable to sleep develops into chronic insomnia, a person's health can be seriously compromised. So what are we to make of this Advent imperative: keep awake therefore?

Well, I don't actually think we're being asked to go without sleep. To assume the text is suggesting that is to fall into the worst kind of literalism. It's probably more helpful to instead of saying "keep awake" to say, "stay alert": Be ready. Be watchful. Be prepared. But in order to be these things—to be ready—we also need to be rested, which is one of the holy paradoxes of this season of Advent.

Now, when I say we need to be rested, I'm not talking about a state of physical, emotional, and spiritual dissipation, about sitting around doing nothing. I'm talking about taking a rest from all of the things that keep us up at night, the things that sap our energy: our anxieties, preoccupations, and fears.

Of course you and I are probably not incapacitated by anxieties, preoccupations, and fears but we still have them. No doubt they're quite minor, especially when set aside the real causes of sleeplessness and worry that are all too pervasive these days. Worries about the economy, current events, political upheaval—to say nothing of job security, the opioid crisis, and other signs of societal decay—are enough to keep all of us awake at night. And even though there's not much we can do about any of these things, we can't help but fixate on them.

A few summers ago a friend and I were on holiday and we both found ourselves awake in the early dawn. We realized we'd never actually seen the sunrise. Sure, there had plenty of

times when we'd tossed and turned through the night and had been awake for the sun's rising, but we'd never actually made an effort to see it come up over the horizon. So we drove east to a place where we could sit and watch the sunrise. As we sat there, I was amazed how the sun's light was discernible long before it came over the horizon. But when it *did* come over the horizon, it came with an intensity and speed that was downright surprising. And we would have missed it if we hadn't been able to sleep.

You see, Advent is about how God's intervention in the world was perceived by those who knew that the present cares of the world can make us miss the coming of the Kingdom. When Jesus said, "Keep awake therefore," he wasn't enjoining us to become spiritual insomniacs. Rather, he was cautioning us not to be enervated by all of the things that seem so powerfully and pressingly urgent. What's more, he was encouraging us to be alert to the beautiful and surprising signs of the Kingdom's sudden dawning in a darkened world. Sometimes, all we need to do is be open to its possibility. Sometimes, the only thing we can do is go out into the darkness in expectation of the rising light's benediction.
