From the Rector

Dear Friends,

"Ask not for whom the bell tolls. It tolls for thee," John Donne famously wrote. The image would have been familiar to his first readers—much more so than it is for us. Before technology made communication easy, church bells were tolled for many reasons, one of them being when someone died. The sex of person was denoted by the number of tells (strokes): three times three for men and three times two for women. Over time

the term "tellers" was corrupted into "tailors"—hence the title of Dorothy Sayers's *The Nine Tailors*, a murder mystery in which campanology is a major feature.

But bells were used for other reasons, too. They were used to summon people to church and they were used to alert the faithful to certain important moments of the mass. Some of us have been to the Musée d'Orsay in Paris where Millet's famous painting *The Angelus* is on permanent display. It shows two workers with heads bowed and hands clasped praying silently as the church bell in the distance chimes the Angelus, signifying the end of the work day.

During the service itself, the bells were tolled at various times during the Canon of the Mass (what we now call the Eucharistic Prayer.) First, there was a "warning bell" rung to signify that the bread and wine were about to be consecrated. Then there were bells as the bread and wine were elevated high by the celebrant. Finally there were bells to denote the conclusion of the prayer. All of this was done because the people in church could neither hear the prayer (it was said silently—or at least *sotto voce*—by the celebrant) and even if they could have heard it, they wouldn't have understood it since the priest spoke in Latin.

The necessity of all of these things was obviated by the Reformation. But they still are used, even if in symbolic and ceremonial ways. On Sunday, I am beginning an experiment with bells. Not only will we continue to ring the bell before the service, we're also going to have a "warning bell" and bells after the consecration of the bread and wine. This won't be a weekly practice, but will be used at the great festivals such as All Saints, which we are celebrating on Sunday.

And speaking of All Saints, don't forget to email the names of loved ones who have died

since November 1, 2021. **PLEASE** email me, not Erin in the office. These names will be read during the Eucharistic prayer itself rather than the Prayers of the People. It's a beautiful and moving practice.

I can think of no better ending for this message than the final stanza of A E Housman's Bredon Hill:

The bells they sound on Bredon And still the steeples hum, "Come all to church good people,"— Oh, noisy bells, be dumb; I hear you, I will come.

These will be worthwhile, interesting and important meetings. We encourage everyone to participate and determine the areas of focus for St. Mark's.

Another reminder that we have coffee hour after the 10:30 a.m. Sunday Service. Please stay and enjoy some fellowship. Thanks to Rita Brown and her team for doing this each Sunday.

An Afternoon Tea and Christmas Tree Trimming is scheduled for December 15th, 2022 in Addison Hall. A time has yet to be determined, but will be published in the E-News when it has been decided.

We really hope to see more of you back regularly to your Church. Music is once again a significant part of the service with the choir back, Father Leighton's choice of hymns and the leadership of James Bourne our choirmaster and organist.
