From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Yesterday was the feast of Michael and All Angels. The English word "angel" is derived from the Greek word *aggelos* which means messenger. It also reminds me of something the diarist Lady Diana Cooper, a close friend of Waugh's, once wrote to her son about her friend Evelyn Waugh: "He is a bad man for whom an angel is struggling."

There's no doubt that life can be a struggle, and choosing the right thing, the Godly thing—to respond to the better angels of our nature—is inevitably to be in opposition with baser things, with devilish motives and self-serving interests. We can either strive to climb up higher to God or choose to let go and tumble down, down, down.

And that, by and large, is what we have done because it's so easy to let go, and to let ourselves go, both individually and corporately and to give in and give up and become fatalistic to the point where we say, in effect, "Why bother? *Après moi le déluge.*" There's no doubt it takes far more effort and grit to hang on—and to hang in. Thus, since we struggle between acquiescence and aspiration, we find ourselves in a perpetual state of war: war within ourselves, war within our families, war within our communities. Yet this need not be our eternal fate, nor does it even have to be our lot in this present age because we do have a choice: a choice to turn away from these demons and toward those better angels.

Our sacred tradition tells us that that which was perfect—heaven on earth—was corrupted by human ambition, ego, and vanity. But, more importantly, it tells us that it was also redeemed by divine compassion, selflessness, and humility—qualities you and I are are called to embody since we're also—whether we like it or not—the Church's angels. Its messengers. So we need to think seriously about what kind of angel we will be and what sort of message we will proclaim. Will it be one of sour, sectarian self-satisfaction which stubbornly proclaims that future hope lies in recovering past glories? Or will it be one of eager, expectant hope which inspires people to live in a way that future promises are given priority?
