From the Rector

A cold coming we had of it, Just the worst time of the year For a journey, and such a long journey: The ways deep and the weather sharp The very dead of winter.

So writes T. S. Eliot at the beginning of his poem "The Journey of the Magi." Today is the feast of the Epiphany, the day when we hear the story of the visit of the Magi—the Wise Men—who brought gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the young

Jesus. In their story we discover and see our own story, namely that we are to give fully of ourselves to Christ so that, little by little, the light of his love will dawn in every human heart and in the midst of every human circumstance.

The world assumes that the season of giving is over. Now all the bills have started coming in and folks need to contend with the fact that they may have given more than they could afford. And if we're honest with ourselves, we have to admit that we've given so much over the last weeks—cards and presents and food—that we have nothing left to give. We're exhausted, and we feel a great need to spend something on ourselves.

But when we look closer at the Epiphany story, we quickly realize that not only is it one of journeying but also one of giving. There's no doubt that the journey of faith can be a wintery and arduous and disagreeable one. Yet if we have the courage to take it, to set out in the cold and the dark and the uncertainty and the fearfulness with the expectation *that at the end of our journey we will give all we have away to the one who himself has given all away*, then we shall not only begin to discover deep and wondrous and precious things about God, we shall also begin to discover profound and astonishing and important things about ourselves. We shall discover that the place we are journeying to is, as Frederick Buechner once memorably said, the place where our deep gladness and the world's deep hunger meet.

The cold truth is we've spent too much on things that don't matter, and we're afraid to spend anything more, even on the things that do matter. Yet we also know that there is one great thing that's worth emptying the account of our life for. And so we begin our Epiphany journey anew. One of the great truths of our faith is that when we serve the lowliest and meekest of the earth, we also serve God. We are called to give ourselves to his service—

which is to say we are called to serve the world in his name and for his sake—and to do so in such a way that our service isn't mere tokenism, but is truly costly.

To the world, the season of giving is over. But for you and me it is just beginning. Shall we not consider making our whole life a gift to God, his Christ and his world in the promise that when we do so, what we give away and what we want to get become, through some mysterious and divine bookkeeping, what we really want? The Magi have a message for us: move beyond your comfort zone. Now, more than ever, God needs extravagant givers: extravagant in time, sympathy, and fearlessness. Give, as they say, till it hurts, and even at this coldest time of year we will find our hearts truly warmed.
