Dear Friends.

"Taste is the only morality," John Ruskin once said. "Show me what you like and I will tell you what you are." Some of you have seen pictures on social media of the rectory as it slowly comes together and have no doubt discovered that my tastes run to the ... sparkling and gilded! So, following Ruskin's logic, does this mean I'm the human equivalent of a magpie?

All joking aside, our tastes do reflect our personalities and reveal who and what we are. And so this summer, I thought I could share a little bit of what I like as a means of introducing myself a little more to all of you.

But I'm not going to start with antiques and porcelain and auctions—though these things do occupy my thoughts much of the time. No: I'm going to start with the one thing I can't live without which is music. Classical music—or what a composer friend of mine now prefers to call "Art Music"—is the soundtrack of my life.

The composer I first fell in love with, and who remains my great love, is Handel. In the popular imagination he is known for a handful of works (like Messiah) but there is so much more. The fecundity of his musical and artistic imagination was astonishing, as the "rediscovery" of his operas (which had languished in obscurity for 200 years) has proved. Listen to one of his late masterpieces like *Hercules* or *Theodora* and you'll hear what I mean.

My musical horizons expanded in junior high when my cello teacher Helen, who is a dear friend to this day (and NOTL resident), exposed me to all kinds of music. I remember one afternoon in particular when she introduced me to Stravinsky's *Rite of Spring*. Even now, hearing the plaintive bassoon solo which opens that tremendous masterpiece brings me back to that memorable day.

And so it has been ever since. Like all of you, not having live music and arts performances has been the hardest part of this pandemic. But now, being so close to Toronto I am eagerly looking forward to being able to hear the TSO and attend COC performances.

And then there's church. There's nothing like a thundering hymn or a sublime piece of vocal

polyphony to elevate one's spirit. What a day it will be when we're all back in church singing together! Of course there are those who think music in church is there simply for our enjoyment. In this I am in total agreement with Handel who, when he heard people enjoyed his oratorios, said, "I should be sorry if I only entertained them. I hoped to make them better."

2 Samuel 6:1-5,12b-19 With God's help, David has won battles over the Philistines; but in one, they captured the Ark. While it was in their hands, the Philistines suffered a plague which they blamed on the Ark, and so returned it to Israel.

Ephesians 1:3-14 Paul gives thanks to God for the spiritual blessings which are bestowed on the Christian by virtue of baptism. He also exhorts his readers to recognize the purpose of these blessings of the Christian life: to live "to the praise of [God's] glory."

Mark 6:14-29 Jesus' disciples have gone out, preached repentance, cast out demons, and cured many sick people but, while the crowds mill round him, the authorities are beginning to reject him. Herod has heard of the miracles done by the disciples, or of Jesus' fame – or both.
