In the month of August, the Rector's column will be guest written by Interim Director of Music Michael Bloss.

### ...this singing thing.

As Anglicans we share a rich theological and liturgical tradition. In our worship tradition, music embraces a unique role in the way it dramatizes and expresses the Word. Music brings to life its imagery and emotion through melody and style over many centuries now. There is an undeniable and ineffable choral repertoire which has become associated with Anglican liturgy, including, services of Matins, Eucharist and Evensong, to name but a few. However, the singing of the congregation is no less important, beginning as it did long ago in psalmodic Jewish tradition. In actual fact, the popular series, The Chosen, Season 3, Episode 8 portrays, fairly accurately (inasmuch as we are of the performance practice of the time),

As the "big choir", the congregation proclaims and reflects upon its pastoral calling both to one another as well as the larger community outside the church. Oftentimes churches will present Hymn Festivals, in effect hymn "concerts" where hymns and their stories are celebrated. A particularly rich genre is the hymn singing in Appalachia, known as "shape note" singing where the gathered are the choir, made up of everyone in the town, young and old alike. Congregations themselves will also observe how the hymns selected will parallel and interpret the readings heard in the proclamation of the Word, thus speaking to their own sense of community.

Ultimately, as the apostle Paul reminds us, we are to "sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs" (Eph. 5:19). And we are to do so with energy, good courage and an eye to what we are singing – this according to Charles Wesley's Rules of Singing (1761) – but more about him next time. So we are invited to bring all of ourselves – soul, mind and body – to our congregational singing.

Directors of Music and Rectors share this lovely collaboration in the provision of Word and Song in services of the Church. The symbiosis creates music that prays and prayers that sing. My part in this collaboration entails the selection of hymns which speak to the readings of the day. The Lectionary over the next weeks gives us a wealth of eucharistic readings from John. See how the Gradual hymn this Sunday picks up on blessing the bread, the new manna. Also, how the final hymn delivers the same closing line "one church, one Lord, one faith" as a refrain to each verse as was heard in the Epistle reading.

That is something to sing about!

### **From the Wardens**

Cherry Festival raised \$56,000 this year. Its success is thanks to the efforts of many people. My great thanks to you all!

The total is \$1,200 less than last year. Expenses were \$2,000 higher this year and that made the difference. These included two tents, higher food costs, higher materials costs like the pie plates, and more signs.

St. Mark's first rector, the Reverend Robert Addison, arrived in July 1792 with a collection of over 1,500 volumes, which is the oldest library in Ontario. In 1862, Addison's grandsons presented the library "To the Rector of St. Mark's Church, Niagara, And his Successors in perpetuity." Two of the volumes in the Addison Library are manuscripts. One of them, a collection of 18<sup>th</sup> century sermons, has already been published by St. Mark's Archives Committee. The scholars who catalogued the Addison Library said about the other, "One of the most interesting and valuable items that may have been added to Robert Addison's library before his departure for Canada is not a printed book, but a MS (No. 1254) filled with notes on sermons and records of sermons preached from early in 1756 to the end of 1780, kept in a neat 18<sup>th</sup> century hand."

St. Mark's Archives Committee plans to publish the Notebook, as a companion to the 18<sup>th</sup> Century Sermons to make it more available to scholars studying the English Dissenters, and particularly their community in Hackney in the latter half of the eighteenth century. Like the Sermons, the Notebook will be published as a limited edition. Carruthers will print the 188-page text on

70 lb. natural text stock and Van Huízen will complete the volumes with Smyth sewn pages and marble endpapers, bound and trimmed to  $8-3/8 \times 10-7/8$  with calf leather and gold stamped spines.

We invite those interested in supporting this project to become patrons. Patrons' names will be listed in the front of the limited-edition publication of the Notebook.
