From the Rector

A Yale theologian, William Muehl, told the story of a children's Christmas pageant which his young son was part of. Because of the size of the nursery class, there were a larger than usual number of angels and shepherds as part of the tableau vivant. In order to make sure each child was in the right place, the teacher — who was also the impresario — made a series of chalk marks on the floor: circles for angles and crosses for shepherds. The rehearsals went magnificently well, and the children were easily able to find their mark. The trouble was, the

children were always in street-clothes at the rehearsals, and so, at the time of the actual event, each angel's long, diaphanous skirt covered not only her own circle, but the adjacent cross as well. The boys playing the shepherds were confused and tried to find their places — but to no avail. Finally, one little shepherd boy said to the teacher in the wings, "These damned angels are fouling up this whole show. They've hidden all the crosses!"

The author continues:

The pageant is over, the embarrassment has passed, and the child is a man. But his furious proclamation still strikes me as a trenchant comment on the human predicament. We are, indeed 'damned angels,' possessors of gifts and insights which we turn to works of destruction, victims of burdens and infirmities which become occasions for glory. The rich pageant of life is often fouled up by our rigid moralism and the cross is hidden beneath the flimsy fabric of our simple piety. With the best intentions we do the worst thing, and then perform miracles of love almost by accident. Our flesh drives and afflicts us from birth to death. But we have the gall to affirm that it once sheltered the Eternal.

Most of us try to soft-pedal the outrageousness of that affirmation by making Christmas an affair of nostalgia and sentimentality. Alas, the season's sentimental pieties and nostalgic longings only serve to veil the deepest truth of Christ's incarnation from us.

There's no doubt that it's a truth which clashes with all of the contrived tableaux of our religious escapism this season. But there's no stability or safety or salvation in those contrived scenes since our salvation wasn't wrought in the downy straw of an improvised basinet. It came through the love of one who was not ashamed to become — if only for a

season, and for our sake — one of the damned angels. And it was wrought on wood far harder and crueller and more precious than the wood of a manger.

So this Christmas season and beyond, may we find the hidden crosses and stand on them, and learn anew that the Eternal became human so that humanity could inherit eternity, so that the groaning of the damned angels of earth could be transformed into the celestial harmonies of the Christmas angels of redemption who even now sweetly sing to us songs of divine love.






