From the Rector

Praying into our songs and singing out of our prayers.

The noted American preacher, Fred B. Craddock, in his book *Preaching* states, "Passion makes one persuasive". While these words inspire the context of a preaching vocation to the church, we might easily take onto ourselves this idea of "passionate persuasion" whenever we participate in the

drama of the liturgy. So, who exactly are we trying to persuade and how is this to be *in praxis*?

Faithfully we recite the Nicene Creed each week in the Eucharist. We take the translation of *credo*, the first word of this creed in Latin, as "I believe". However, consider a more literal meaning as "I give my heart..." It is the language of one's heart, the most profound expression of commitment, not simply a list of statements to which one gives intellectual assent. Essentially, the first person to persuade us of our faithfulness is ourselves.

The process of self-expression, bringing to voice the emotional connection and spiritual awareness to our faith, lies at the very heart of our sung and spoken responses in the liturgy. The invitation to do so is rooted fundamentally in scripture, but also in the philosophy of the Reformation. We are compelled to "make a joyful noise to the Lord", and "Rejoice! And again, I say Rejoice". I've also written about Wesley's 1761 instructions for singing. As we wholeheartedly participate, we become a **community**, rather than just an impersonal **congregation**.

What does this mean? Principally, it means joining your voice to the ones around you. Sing and speak in an "outdoor" voice; strong, projected, and with confidence. Do not let any perceived inhibitions get in the way. Your neighbouring worshipper is waiting to be inspired by the **presence** of your voice so they can be encouraged to strengthen their voice with another, becoming a cascading response! Singing the psalms is just as much your primary role as are the hymns. Responses to the prayers and the other spoken parts of the liturgy benefit from the same projective approach. Remember, please, that the role of the choir is to encourage by joining your singing, **not** to replace your participation. Besides, why shouldn't the presence of singing between choir and community encourage strength and proclamation at least as much as would be expected from within the community?

Nothing invites the **visitor** to a community of faith like the strength and vigour of its participation in the liturgy. And so, the persuasive passion is for much more than just St. Mark's, it is also vital for our outreach into the community. It reveals an invitation to be a part of the open, authentic, and beautiful parish that we are.

May St. Mark's full-throated Credo affirm a commitment to persuading the world that the Gospel is real, alive, and meaningful for life. Our Credo. Our Life.

That is something to sing about!
