From the Rector

Ash Wednesday is February 14. There are two services of Holy Eucharist with the Imposition of Ashes that day at 10 am and 5 pm.

Sometimes the phrase "dining on ashes" is used to describe people who are always ruminating about, and obsessing over, past failures and regrets. Many years ago, when I was ruminating on all of those "What if...?" questions we tend to ask ourselves when things aren't going too well, a

sagacious friend said to me that life isn't "What if?", it's "What *is.*" And so, with my friend's advice in mind, I want to suggest to you that Ash Wednesday's liturgy will invite you and me to move from obsessing over all of the "what if?" questions to a joyful acceptance of what *is*.

True, the service can seem like the liturgical example of dining on ashes, what with its long laundry list of failures and mistakes and—well, sins. This is why so many people stay away from church on Ash Wednesday. For just as there are a large number of people who can't help themselves from playing over and over the tapes of their lives' failures, there are also a large number of people who won't admit that they have regrets, that they have things to be ashamed of. Of course they *do*, but their sense of self is fecklessly contingent on the maintenance of an impenetrable and confident façade. Such people are not given to engaging in self-examination. They are stuck in blind alleys because they are afraid of looking "weak." This leads them to defensiveness and rationalization, insisting they've never been wrong, have never made poor choices, and that everything is someone else's fault.

But if we're to have vital and healthy spiritual lives, we need to acknowledge and confront our faults. Our faith, liberating and comforting though it may be, isn't escapism. Nor is it without demands. The truth is, it's liberating to admit that we've been weak and made mistakes. We speak of being forgiven for the wrongs we've done, but I think we need to reframe that notion. What we need to be forgiven for is our propensity to deny our weakness, believing that we are strong enough to cope with life's demands on our own. How many people have a negative image of God, an image of the stern and judgemental father, and spend their whole lives running away from him and trying to hide? How many people have an image of God that gives little dignity?

But we don't stay in the place of penitence, forever rummaging around in the past with

some sort of spiritual masochism. Not at all. We name our sins for what they are; we admit that we are who we are, and we turn to God for help. And it is in the turning that we are given the opportunity—that we are given *permission*—to leave all of the things we regret and are ashamed of behind. They no longer have power over us.

Ash Wednesday allows us to proclaim that the only thing that has power over us is the power of the cross. That's why we have crosses of ash smeared onto our foreheads. Out of the ashes of ultimate failure and sin comes the symbol of ultimate victory and forgiveness, a symbol that reminds us there is nothing we have done that's unforgivable in God's sight. And there's no power stronger than the power of his redeeming love—not even the power of death.

So come on Wednesday and name all of the things you have tried so long to ignore and know the liberating power of forgiveness. Come knowing that you can stop fixating on what might have been and receive the gift of forgiveness that is. And come in the knowledge that you need no longer dine on ashes because you have been given the bread of life and the cup of salvation, holy food wrought on the tree of life.

Day of Prayer and Fasting: February 16

In a joint letter to Anglicans and Lutherans, Archbishop Linda Nicholls, along with Bishop Susan Johnson of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, has called for a day of prayer and fasting on February 16, 2024. This is an opportunity to collectively list our voices and hearts united in prayer, centred around the continued violence in Ukraine, as well as in Israel and Gaza, trusting that God is



listening, acting, and present with all who are suffering or feel powerless.

Those participating are invited to fast from food or from social media, computer time, music, television or whatever else may be appropriate. During the day, the primate and national bishop encourage us to stop and pray throughout the day, <u>using the prayers provided</u> or simply crying from our hearts to God about the situations in Israel, Palestine, Gaza, and Ukraine. Gathering with friends, family, or church members, is encouraged.

To conclude the day, join Bishop Susan Johnson and Primate Linda Nicholl<u>son Friday,</u> <u>February 16, at 7 p.m. EST for a 30-minute prayer service on Facebook</u>.


Gary Burroughs has kindly offered to lead the event, and must assemble a team to ensure its success.

Did you know ...

The Reverend Harry Nelson Mansfield was ordained to the priesthood at the church of St. Thomas in Hamilton, Ontario on May 29, 1953. He served as Deacon at St. George's Church St. Catharine's for two years. **In 1959, he was inducted as Rector of St. Mark's Anglican Church.**

During his time in Niagara-on-the-Lake Rector Mansfield, after much consideration, decided that his vocation as a parish priest was over. He began to prepare himself to teach university students. In 1965, he entered Yale University and completed his Master of Divinity degree the following year. He entered a doctoral programme at McMaster University and was invited to join the faculty in 1969. He was very happy in his work. Tragedy would strike quickly as Harry was diagnosed with leukemia and died within ten months at age 41. He left behind a wife and three young children.

The Reverend Mansfield was interred near the north wall of St. Mark's Anglican Church.
