From the Rector

Years ago, I officiated at the wedding of dear friends. It was followed by an extravagant reception with a fully-stocked open bar which almost everyone made good use of. A few weeks later, I went to dinner with the couple and they told me the staggering price of the bar bill. "Everyone drank premium liquor!" they said. "Well of course," I replied. "Who's going to drink Apothic Red when Petrus is available?"

On Sunday, we'll hear the familiar gospel story of the Wedding at Cana where Jesus turned

several dozen gallons of water into the best wine imaginable causing the steward to say to the bridegroom, "Everyone serves the good wine first and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now."

Conventional theology suggests that this is about the goodness and abundance of eternal life. Not for nothing does the story begin with the phrase *three days later*—an allusion to Jesus' being raised from the dead on the third day. Maybe I should just leave it at that, but I can't.

I can't because if the best wine is available right now—or at least the means to make it available are—why wait to enjoy it? Sure, people won't hold back when the best is freely and abundantly offered—as my friends learned. But isn't that the point of abundant hospitality? Aren't the good things in life to be enjoyed now?

That includes the Christian life. For too long the promise of new and unending life has been spoken of as something to be enjoyed after an earthy life of toil, uncertainty, and grief. But surely the point of Jesus' resurrection is that new and unending life begins *now* and can be enjoyed *now*.

I've often said that the point of being a Christian isn't to live in a such a way that we get to live with God when we die. The point of being a Christian is to make this world more godly right now through acts of surprising and abundance extravagance. And, God only knows, nothing is more needed in this world which has been all-but-emptied of compassion, generosity, and hope. Which is waiting to be filled with divine life.

In the gospel Mary said to the steward, "Do whatever he tells you." If we apply this to ourselves, we know that he's told us to live and love extravagantly, to give the best of ourselves for the sake of the world, to fill people up with hope, and joy, and purpose. To show them the best isn't yet to come—because it's already here: eternity's promise poured out upon us today.
