From the Rector

On Sunday we'll hear the gospel story where Jesus said "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." Alas, that reading will omit the climax of the story where the people Jesus said this to became enraged, ran him out of town, and tried to throw him off a cliff. Their religious sensibilities were upset by Jesus saying his mission was to bring good news to the poor, recovery of sight to the blind and liberation to the oppressed. And their religious sensibilities were also upset by Jesus' implication that the kingdom of God wasn't some magical fairyland

somewhere over yonder but right in the midst of them now.

Now, our religious sensibilities may be less upset by these ideas than their were. But hearing them still makes us squirm. That's because we know it's much easier to ignore problems than to solve them. It's much easier to disregard people than to liberate them. And none of us alone can solve the big social problems, like poverty and addiction, racism or war. That may be so, but as followers of Jesus it's our solemn duty to look clearly at what's happening, to speak the truth about it, and to act for love and justice. Our splendid, awesome, terrifying mission is to be idealists and to stand and struggle for people who are on the margins of society. And though each of us is sometimes tempted to throw in the towel and give up, we are called to work to bring the ideal of the Kingdom a little nearer.s

It's true that the road between our present reality and the promised Kingdom is filled with challenges and dangers. But it's also true to say that the road to the Kingdom is the Kingdom—it is the way.

On that way the agony of reality meets the ecstasy of idealism, and it's our task to embrace the ideal so that the reality of the present doesn't overwhelm and defeat us. Because if we wait until we've got it all figured out, we'll never do anything at all. Christianity needs to be practiced in the living, the toiling, and the striving. And the Christian ideal, put into practice, can work like a fermenting agent. It can help to open eyes and hearts and hands and to break down walls, build bridges, and bring healing.

Christ's liberating message of love turned the world upside down once before, or as G. K. Chesterton so memorably said, turned the world right side up, and it can do it again. That's

not a fairytale told in cloud-cuckoo land, nor is it a nice but unattainable ideal. It's the simple truth learned on the way when we bring good news to the poor, proclaim release to the captives, and offer recovery of sight to the blind. For by such learning will all of us find our true home, which is none other than the heart of God.

It's been quite some time since we featured a "Did you know..." story in E-News, but this one is particularly intriguing, so we had to include it—special thanks to Donald Combe for researching and writing this fascinating history of St. Mark's organs.

Did you know....

That Andrew Henderson, DMA, MA (CANTAB), FRCCO, is the Director of Music and Organist at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City? Originally from Thorold, Ontario, he developed an early interest in music, completing a project on pipe organs in the Niagara Peninsula at age of 13, which he published. Andrew is currently documenting the instruments at St. Mark's; however, he is eager to learn more about the previous pipe

organs housed there. To aid in this research, he contacted Donald Combe, who reviewed the files at St. Mark's but unfortunately could not find any relevant information.

According to Mr. Henderson's research, St. George's in St. Catharines is said to have the earliest pipe organ in the area, dating back to 1848. However, St. Mark's had a pipe organ in the west gallery as early as 1842, as there is a record of an organist from that time. Additionally, a photograph from the 1890s of the interior of St. Mark's shows organ pipes on either side of the chancel.

Donald reviewed vestry minutes from 1842 to 1895 and discovered some intriguing facts.

The 19th-century vestry minutes of St. Mark's primarily documented the names of those present at meetings and listed the individuals appointed as wardens for the upcoming year. Significant attention was given to identifying those with overdue pew rents, including the amounts they owed in back payments. The minutes also addressed various financial matters, which often presented a bleak picture. Additionally, they included some interesting information about the pipe organs at St. Mark's.

From the vestry minutes of St. Mark's 1842-1896

- **1842** ...organist was paid £10
- **1843** ...to pay the present organist the sum of £10 for his services during 1843
- **1845** ...organist £10
- **1846** ...Mr. Carlisle was continued as organist and to be allowed £5 for teaching the choir and his present salary to be doubled from the first of July next for the then ensuing half year and from thence to receive at the rate of £25 per annum
- 1847 ...the salary of the organist was to be £15
- 1848 ...Mr. Carlisle appointed organist
- **1852** ...the salary of the organist remain as last year and the subject of an allowance to Mr. Todd as leader of choir to be left to the decision of the rector
- **1853** ...organist's salary to remain as last year
- **1855** ...the salary of the organist to be raised to £40 after the expiration of this year's service in the month of November next
- **1857** ...appointed T.R. Walls organist at the salary of £50 (the rector received £420)
- **1860** ...thanks to Miss(?) Powell for her valuable services in playing the organ and sustaining the singing for the greater part of last year
- **1863** ...many thanks to Miss Powell for indefatigable exertions in maintaining the choir into efficient and acceptable a manner during the past year
- **1866** ...thanks justly due and heartily given to John Powell for his efficient management of the choir for several years without any expense and also to the Misses Powell's and to other members of the choir who well and willingly performed their respective parts under his superintendence
- **1867** ...thanks Mrs. Powell as organist and choir
- **1868** ...thanks to Miss Powell as organist and choir leader
- **1870** ...thanks of the congregation of St. Mark's Church Niagara are justly due and are hereby given to Miss Marion Winterbottom for her valuable services as organist and beg her acceptance of the accompanying purse as an acknowledgment of their appreciation of her indefatigable exertions towards sustaining the efficiency of the choir

1871 - ...\$50 to the organist

1879 - ...a proposal of the removal of the organ from the loft to the body of the church and placing the choir in the body of the church

1881 - ...talk of a new organ

1888 - ...Mr. Hallowell resigned the position of choir master appointing a leader left in the hands of the Church Wardens

1889 - ...proposed improvements and the gallery to be removed

1895 - ...thanks to Captain Dickson for the trouble he has taken with the choir during the past year with the choir


1896 - ...thanks to the organist and the choir for efficient services.

- In 1841, the province of Canada, as a British colony, adopted the Canadian pound.
- Replacing the Canadian pound in 1858, the Canadian dollar was aligned with the US dollar with both US dollars and British sovereign gold coins also serving as legal tender in Canada.

£10 in 1842 = £930.59 in 2023

£25 in 1846 = £2398.43 in 2023

£420 in 1857 = £40,294.91 in 2023
