From the Rector

On Sunday, we'll celebrate the Holy Trinity. It's a peculiar festival, insofar as it's dedicated to an idea rather than a person or event. And it's even more peculiar because the idea itself is abstruse and problematic. Since it's something we've received as Christians—it's part of our heritage—it can't easily be sidestepped or ignored. But does that mean it can't be challenged?

Anglicans have long spoken of our theological understanding being grounded in tradition,

scripture, and reason. That nice, tripartite elucidation comes from Richard Hooker, one of Anglicanism's first—and most erudite—defenders. But that's a topic for another time. Today, I'm interested in how the doctrine of the Trinity stands up when measured against tradition, scripture, and reason.

Well, when it comes to *tradition* the doctrine does very well. It was elucidated way back in the Fourth Century, and every time we recite the Nicene Creed, we're speaking a text that was crafted to encapsulate the nuances of this doctrine. It was written to settle once and for all the idea that Christians were monotheists, despite their instance on a triune God.

Alas, it's as much a political text as it is a*scriptural* one since the Trinity isn't clearly stated in scripture. At least, it isn't in the way the Creed describes. It's an idea that's read into scripture rather than drawn out of scripture.

As for it being *reasonable*?—it isn't. Everyone knows this, which is why theologians and philosophers fall back on old tropes like "It's a mystery beyond our comprehension." Fine. But if it's beyond our comprehension, why should it warrant our attention?

In its classic formulations, it probably shouldn't. And let's face it: most of us don't worry too much about it. Yet the Trinity <u>should</u> warrant our attention because it might just tell us something about God. Not that God is apprehended as three independent persons, but as three codependent realities, and is known through the importance of relationships, by the life-giving necessity of unity, and in the holiness of love. Or, to put it another way, since we've certainly moved beyond the antediluvian idea that some people in relationships are subordinate to others, one person in a relationship is no more important than an another person.

Because isn't it true that for there to be unity, concord, and harmony, everyone needs to be given their rightful respect, honour, and dignity? And since this is true in human affairs, how can it not be true in divine ones? All of which means that while we don't know how Father, Son, and Spirit can be distinct yet one, we do know that our only hope is in a God above us calling us to a higher purpose in a world which seems meaningless. A God with us encouraging us to be brave in a world which can be fearsome. A God within us emboldening us to love in a world which is so often characterized by hate.

So maybe the mystery of the Trinity is that God can't do it alone. Maybe the grace of the Trinity is that God's calling us to be his divine partner. Maybe the truth of the Trinity is that God can't be limited to just one image.

Did you know...

..that Brock's Monument towers over Queenston Heights, measuring 56 metres (185 feet) in height? This is the largest monument of its kind in Canada, and the fourth oldest war memorial in the country.

Major-General Sir Isaac Brock is best known for defending Upper Canada against the American forces in the War of 1812.

An earlier monument to Brock was erected and stood from 1824 until April 17, 1840, when an explosive charge did serious and irreparable damage to the monument. It did not, however, bring down the monument. This attack was thought to have been orchestrated by Benjamin Lett, an anti-British agitator and participant in the 1837 Rebellion, but this has never been proven.


A campaign to rebuild the monument began almost immediately. In 1852, Toronto architect William Thomas had his design selected for a monument even grander than the first. Construction began in 1853 and again used limestone from the Queenston Quarry. This was completed in 1856. The remains of Brock were led back up Queenston Heights and interred again. The monument was officially inaugurated on October 13, 1859.

On the re-interment, two oval plates were attached to Brock's coffin. They read:

Here lie the earthly remains of a brave and virtuous hero, /
Major-General Sir Isaac Brock, /
Commander of the British forces, / and President Administering / the Government
of Upper Canada, /
Who fell when gloriously engaging the Enemies / of his Country, /
at the head of the Flank Companies / of the 49th Regiment, /
in the Town of Queenstown, / on the morning of the 13th October, 1812, /
aged 42 years.
