From the Rector

Around this time of year, as I was finishing my second year of seminary, my friend Bryan came to New York to visit me and another friend of his who also lived in the city. Bryan gave this other friend my phone number. (This was in the days before cell phones became ubiquitous.)

The friend called a couple of nights later as I was in the middle of hosting a cocktail party. He sounded very shy and hesitant. "Oh hello. I'm so sorry to disturb you. Am I interrupting your prayer

time?" "No," I said, "this is now cocktail time, just like anywhere else." Silence on the other end. "I'll get Bryan for you," I said. He came in and picked up the phone. I heard him saying things like, "The noise in the background? There's a party going on. Yes ... a party. Yes, they're allowed to do that. Yes, you can come over if you want. No, they couldn't care less if you've never been to Church..." And so on.

I don't know whatever happened to Bryan's friend; he certainly didn't come down to the seminary. I take it he was too freaked out that religious people—seminarians, no less—were just like regular folk. I suspect his paradigm for a person of faith, a paradigm constructed in large part by Hollywood and Madison Avenue, was someone who is brittle, narrow, sanctimonious, pious, and psychologically constipated.

There's no doubt the assumption that the life of faith is one that exhibits certain qualities and embodies a particular style dies hard—even among those of us who are people of faith. When we speak of faith, we usually mean something like giving blind assent to a set of beliefs or propositions about God, or believing in something without having any evidence to confirm the beliefs. And when we talk of having a life of faith, we are talking about living according to certain values, principles, and ideas, about being a certain kind of person. Since people tend to think that the life of faith is one that is morally pure, unambiguously confident, and serenely joyful, they likewise assume that being Christian means looking, acting, and thinking in certain ways.

But a faithful life isn't one that is free from guilt and shame and failing. What itis is one in which the fact of sin is named and claimed and forgiven. To acknowledge—to confess—who we really are is an act of faith, and at the moment of confession, we die to the old self that pretended to be perfect and wholesome and lovely. But that is no cause for despair, for

death is not the end of the story. It is rather the beginning of the story in which we learn that in Christ we are loved more deeply than we could imagine, that through his death we are forgiven even before we could ask, and that by his victory we are saved from having to save ourselves.

Did you know...

.....that the early parishioners thought that they should make St. Mark's "a little piece of England". As a result, there are a number of interesting non-native species of trees in the churchyard. In front of Addison Hall, there is an Ironwood tree. Ironwood is so named because of the hardness of its wood. In some places, it was used for wagon axles. Given

that these trees grow very slowly and seeing the girth of the trunk now, our arborist calculated that this tree dates from the eighteenth century.

To the right of this tree there is a Sweet Chestnut tree. There are lots of native Horse Chestnuts in Niagara, but a Sweet Chestnut is rarely found except on a nut farm.

Small cemeteries are one place where old and exceptional flora and fauna, both native and imported, can still be found in our changed urban environment.
