From the Rector

Today is All Saints Day.

When you think about it, our notions about sainthood tend to be unrealistic. Because saints aren't people who have an overabundance of piety, or a heroic dedication to the poor, or even a deep commitment to the life of prayer. Saints are saints simply because they're holy. Which makes us think that we're out of the running for sainthood. Except holiness isn't confirmed either by moral rectitude or by spiritual courage.

Perhaps you're familiar with four stone figures carved by Michelangelo for a papal tomb. They're unfinished. Yet they're also majestic, commanding, and powerful. And despite their having little detail, we can still perceive human shape and form. John Moses, a former Dean of St. Paul's Cathedral in London, once said of them that "It is as though the figures are still tearing themselves out of the rough stone. They contain the promise of what they might be, but they are still becoming."

You and I know that we are incomplete. That we're unfinished. That we're always learning, questioning, and growing. But we also know that every day we're being fashioned into one of God's saints—not because we have any particular virtues, qualities, or achievements, but solely because God loves us, and has chosen us, and has called us to be living examples of his goodness, love, mercy—his holiness—in the world. Holiness, you see, is both a gift and a goal.

I don't know what you and I will be like when we finally cross the great river and join with those who shine in the glory of perfect holiness. But I do know this: that in struggling to be free, to be honest, to be authentic, to be really real, we do catch a glimpse of what it means to be holy. For we discover that the saints of God are those who strove to reflect the glory of God's love.

Our faith teaches us that the multitudes who now behold God's countenance unveiled forevermore pray for us, because they are still bound to us in mutual service as members of the one body of Christ. So our prayer then must be that we be given grace that even in the midst of this present existence, the people we are destined to be can be revealed—at least a little more fully. Our prayer must be that as God's holy people here on earth, we may have

the strength and courage to do the work we are commanded to do, which is to love one another as he has loved us, and to show forth, not only with our lips but in our lives, God's love to the whole world.

DEDICATION CEREMONY FOR THE NEW MAJOR BENJAMIN GEARY MONUMENT SUNDAY NOVEMBER 10, 2024 AT 10:15 A.M.

Please join us for the dedication ceremony that will commemorate Major Benjamin Geary's bravery at Hill 60 Ypres, Belgium, where he was awarded the Victoria Cross.

Geary was born in England in 1891. During the First World War, he served with the Surrey Regiment, and for "conspicuous bravery and determination" on Hill 60 near Ypres in April 1915, he was awarded the Victoria Cross. He had been severely wounded, but after recuperation, he rejoined his regiment and was again wounded in August 1918. He felt called to the Christian ministry and studied theology. He was ordained in 1921. In 1928 this work brought him to Canada. When the Second World War broke out, he enlisted in the Canadian Army hoping to be sent overseas, but his talents were required as commanding officer of the educational unit in Camp Borden. Following the war he was, for twenty-four years, Sergeant at Arms in the Ontario Legislature. He retired in 1972 and moved to Niagara on the Lake where he attended St. Mark's and was a frequent reader in services until he died in 1976.

time!







Christmas Fundraising Tea and Sale


