From the Rector

On Remembrance Day it's right and necessary to remember all those who fought in war and to honour their valour and sacrifice. But we also need to *do* something which doesn't just honour their memory, but also redeems their loss. But how?

By making love, not war—as the saying goes. Which reminds me of Botticelli's picture *Venus and Mars*. Art Historians tell us that it's an allegory of the pleasures of physical love—but I'm not so sure. It shows Venus, the goddess of

love, reposing on a cushion. Across from her, fast asleep and presumably exhausted from the act of love, is Mars, the god of war. He's almost naked. Love has conquered war; his nakedness is symbolic of his new vulnerability. And not only is Mars naked, his helmet and lance—those instruments of war—are being carried away by three satyrs, while another one places his cuirass under his arm like a pillow. In other words, where once there was chaos and fighting there is now rest and peace because of the power of love.

Imagine what would happen if we were seriously intent on peace and actually dared to reach out in love to those who differ from us, those of different political persuasions, creeds, and value systems? Imagine what would happen if instead of ratcheting up the rhetoric and rattling sabers, the leaders of the nations dared to risk losing face by toning down the rhetoric and speaking, if not exactly in words of love, at least in words of civility and kindness?

I know that all sounds so hopelessly naïve and impossible. But it's been tried before and has been shown to be remarkably effective. At his Crucifixion, Jesus' enemies thought that by the violence of the cross they had got rid of him forever and had finally beaten him. But this they could not do, for in that ultimate act of violence, he loved them with the kind of love which makes enemies friends. The kind of love by which the tragedy of war and violence is redeemed. The kind of love which cannot be defeated and never dies. The kind of love which we remember at this time of year.














This special ceremony will honour the extraordinary bravery of **Major Benjamin Geary**, who, during the pivotal Battle of Hill 60 in Ypres, Belgium, was awarded the Victoria Cross for his heroism. Join us as we pay tribute to a true hero.


Born in England in 1891, Geary served valiantly in the First World War with the Surrey Regiment. His remarkable actions at Hill 60 in April 1915 earned him recognition for "conspicuous bravery and determination". He faced adversity again when wounded in August 1918.

Inspired by his experiences, Geary pursued a calling in the Christian ministry, studying theology and becoming ordained in 1921. His journey brought him to Canada in 1928, where he continued to serve his community. When the Second World War erupted, he enlisted in the Canadian Army, eager to contribute but his leadership skills were essential as the commanding officer of the educational unit at Camp Borden.

After the war, he dedicated twenty-four years as the Sergeant-at-Arms in the Ontario Legislature. **Upon retiring in 1972**, he settled in Niagara-on-the-Lake, actively

participating in St. Mark's Anglican Church and enriching services as a reader until his passing in 1976.

Men's Communion and Breakfast




