From the Rector

At Evening Prayer this past Wednesday, I read excerpts from the sermon Paul Moore, jr. preached at his installation as Bishop of New York in September, 1972. A number of people told me how striking—indeed, how poetic—they found it. So I thought I'd share it with all of you. This is not the full sermon; I've taken excerpts and put them together into what I trust is a coherent whole.

Paul Moore was a complicated and fascinating man. Though he had great personal wealth, he

was a champion of the poor and disenfranchised and never tired of comforting the afflicted and afflicting the comfortable. In 1997 he published an autobiography *Presences: A Bishop's Life in the City* which is a wonderful and inspiring read.

* * * *

We who are assembled here—like millions of our brothers and sisters of all races and faiths throughout the world—are caught today in a tension between a Dream and a Vision. And in the resolution of this tension, the soul of humanity is finally to be found or to be lost.

We cannot live for long without a Dream, without a Vision. Holy history, the mythic history of humanity is set between a Dream and a Vision. The Dream comes misting up from the waters of memory, twisting into the green of life, moving forward to a feeling, thinking, dawn; wandering, changing, touching, loving, wondering, fearing, daring. Then breaks, trembling, cold into the wide arena of fear, violence, and death. So the memory dreams of Eden and the Fall still inhabit our deepness, filling life forever with nostalgia for Eden and fear, engendered by the Fall. Who does not long for Eden? Who does not desire to touch and joy and wonder? And who does not fall finally to anger, violence, fear, and death?

Some, even while lying in the pain of the Fall, have blinked away the blood, and have lifted up their eyes to a Vision, distant as a Dream, yet clearer; glittering in the sunlight of hope; constructed of hard thought, of suffering, of sacrifice. They see a visioned city, domed above the suburb of the three crosses. It is a place of redeeming, a centre of the exchange of blood for new life, a City arising from the Fall, a hospital for healing, a community of bright intelligence. The Visioned City is the Heavenly Jerusalem, reflecting as sunlight the

glory of God.

The Church is the keeper of the Dream and the holder of the Vision. This is to say that the Christian church together with the Jewish people carry through our barren desert knowledge of the roots of our being, where we come from, and the certainty of the end toward which we are bound. Thus did Moses carry the soul of his people over the desert to the promised land; thus did Jesus carry humanity in his Body through the cross to new life; thus in both streams of tradition, there are still floats the life of the past, the wisdom of the present, the hope of the future.

That is to say that together, the Christian Church and the Jewish people preserve for us the life of the past, cherish for us the wisdom of the present, hold up before us the hope for the future.

The Dream of Eden should blend, grow, flow into the heavenly Vision, each nourishing, each interpenetrating the other. But it has not been thus, nor in our lifetime will ever be. No, the road from the Garden to the Kingdom is dangerous and filled with pain. But, at the same time, it is true to say that the road to the kingdom also is the kingdom.

Jesus said, "I am the way," and his way led to the cross. Moses met his Lord in the terror of volcanic Sinai on his way across a desert to a promised land he never touched. No, we are not to be given the privilege of the eschaton here and now. But privilege enough it is to nourish the Dream and to hold up the Vision. But how?

First, the Church is to be a freeing place for twisted souls. Enough of Puritanism, which, in denying the Dream of Eden completely, denied the Vision too, and let forth the monster of individual greed and repressed sexuality on our green and pleasant land. The Church must be free to love and sing and dance on our way, that we may be a freeing power to all.

[Secondly] the Church is to seek peace, justice, and unity in the world, even at the sacrifice of peace and unity within herself. Unity comes through reconciliation. Reconciliation comes through justice. This is an overwhelming task but the God of history and our Incarnate Lord lays it upon us. And, if we fail or are partly destroyed in effort, we have failed as Christ failed, in a victory of love; we have lifted up a Vision of the Kingdom.


