From the Rector

Henry Higgins is now being played by a Black man in the Shaw Festival's acclaimed production of *My Fair Lady*. A generation ago, such casting would have been unthinkable. We're thankfully beyond such thinking—and after all, what could be more Shavian? I say that because Higgins is what these days we'd call a disruptor. He's all about challenging the establishment and its assumptions, conventions, and divisions—especially where language is concerned. As Alan Jay Lerner's witty lyric says, "These verbal class distinctions by now should be antique."

These days, they certainly are antique, yet they still persist—even though we like to think we don't judge people on external things like skin colour or language. That's certainly been true for the Church whose peculiar language has long been a barrier to people longing to know the grace of Jesus' radical message of inclusion in their lives.

I'm thinking of the language of creeds and confessions which, while an important and historic part of the faith, are scarcely understandable to the average person. Over time they have displaced the Church's *lingua franca* which the dictionary defines as a language used for communication between groups of people who speak different languages. And that *lingua franca* is, of course, love.

In David Leavitt's novel *The Lost Language of Cranes*, a character reads a story in a psychiatric journal about a young child, Michel. Left alone in his cot, he learned to emulate construction cranes, as they were the only thing he would see out of his window: "How wondrous, how grand those cranes must have seemed to Michel, compared to the small and clumsy creatures who surrounded him. For each, in his own way ... finds what it is he must love, and loves it; the window becomes a mirror; whatever it is that we love, that is who we are."

For too long the window the Church has looked through was one of conformity and conversion. We fell in love with the language of rules and regulations, and that's what we became. "One common language, I'm afraid we'll never speak," Higgins sings in *My Fair Lady*. But if we are to survive very far into the future—as people, as community, as Church—we must learn again the language of love. For only that language can help us see beyond

the barriers—real and imagined—that separate us. Only that language can disrupt the devilish powers that seek to divide us.

Lerner and Loewe based their iconic musical on G. B. Shaw's play *Pygmalion* and those of you who remember the Greek myths know that Pygmalion was a sculptor who fell in love with his sculpture. Dare I say that God is the divine Pygmalion who looked through the window of his son and fell in love with us to the point that he became what we are so we, in turn, can become what he is?

Great works of theatre, like great novels and works of art, are the window which show us who we really are. They show us our common humanity. They remind us of our core values. But they can't teach us how to speak love's language. Only the One in whom there is no east or west, no north or south but one great fellowship of love throughout the whole wide earth can do that.

It's not a difficult language to learn, but it must be practiced. At least, it must be if we are to become like the One we love.

Third-quarter financial results

Parish Council reviewed St. Mark's third-quarter financial statements ending September 30th at its meeting on Thursday. A summary of income and expenses is presented here to keep the parish informed. The operating balance is solidly in the black at \$42,210, due to a donation of \$50,000 received in July. We are deeply grateful for this one-time, extremely generous donation which has transformed St. Mark's financial stability. While we celebrate this gift, there remain financial liabilities that impact the bottom line, including \$37,000 owning in Diocesan assessment for 2024 and repayment of \$35,000 to the Historic Properties Foundation by 2026.


