## **From the Rector**

If—when!—we're blessed to have lots of children in the congregation, don't expect a children's sermon from me. From a liturgical point of view, there are few things I like less. That's because they're almost inevitably done for the amusement of the adults in the parish. Kids say the darndest things—and all that. They're less about teaching children something about the Bible and more about teaching them that they're there to be cute in front of grown-ups. And what kind of message is that? I think it says that children are welcome because they give the adults a few chuckles before being

sent away. Or, to put it more starkly, children aren't welcome except when they give the congregation something.

And that's how we generally think about new members. They give us something.

All congregations wrestle with how to attract new members—especially younger members. And there's no doubt that all congregations need new members—that is, they need more of them—if they're going to survive. The current membership in our parishes is ageing. Many folks are on fixed incomes. Many are simply worn out. These are all serious issues, but they shouldn't be the driver for seeking new members. The trouble comes with what a retired bishop once called "Vampiric Membership": the need for new blood.

We need to be careful not to fall into the trap of thinking about church growth as being about survival. Because it's about salvation. And if any parish doesn't think that's the only reason people should become members of a congregation, they do deserve to close. A parish isn't an end in itself, but a means to an end.

Which isn't to say we don't want to grow. Of course we do. The more people who join as coworkers in the proclamation of the life-saving gospel, the better. But this means we also need to live in a way that shows evidence of changed lives. We need to talk about how our lives have been changed. And we need to really embrace the truth that unlike other communities, Christian communities exist for the sake of those who aren't their members.

I had a lovely email from someone who came to the Blessing of the Animals on Wednesday. They were deeply touched and extremely appreciative. Will they become members? Probably not. Did they go away with a good feeling about St Mark's. Certainly. In a couple of weeks, we'll be participating in Doors Open. Most of the folks who will tour St Mark's will simply come to look. That's fine, because "doors open" is what we're about. And that's how evangelism works: a door is opened. An invitation is made to walk through the door. And hopefully that open door and that invitation offer a glimpse of something so beautifully compelling and obviously life-changing that folks can't help but want to see for themselves what this is all about.

## CEMETERY UPDATE STONE CLEANING TRAINING

On September 21st, Al Ernest gave a training session to nine enthusiastic students on how to clean historic headstones in the cemetery in a non invasive way. Al is a respected and experienced historic monument restorer and has completed over 110 restorations in our

cemetery over the past four years.

The group cleaned nine headstones near the entrance to the cemetery (the west side at the end of the circular driveway). It was remarkable to see the names come alive once again! The stones are made of various materials including Queenston limestone, and Carrara marble (most common in Ontario cemeteries from the 1790's to 1880's.The veined Vermont marble became popular in the 1870's.) A good example is the newly cleaned Crouch obelisk near the bench in the same area. You can see Sarah McBride's name now on the second stone on the right directly at the end of the driveway. Other stones cleaned include the Grier (John and Mary), McKee twin stone (children) Maria McKee (another child) and the Rolph headstone.

Next spring we will start the 2025 cleaning program and will ask for volunteers to assist. They will be trained by those trained this year (train the trainer). It is a very rewarding experience. The beauty of it is you can work at your own pace and whenever you feel motivated. MORE TO COME IN THE SPRING OF 2025!

#### **TREE PRUNING**

Our annual tree pruning will take place over three days October 7 to 9. The pruning program is to maintain the health of the trees as well as to ensure the safety of those walking through the cemetery.

#### FALL CLEAN UP AND FRIENDS OF THE CEMETERY

A fall clean up of the leaves is scheduled for late October. The cemetery board encourages everyone to give a helping hand when out in the cemetery by picking up small twigs and branches.

Three individuals have helped us over the summer to try and keep the cemetery neat by raking leaves, picking up small branches, pruning ivy and shrubs (near the Memorial Garden) and elsewhere. Their assistance has been invaluable!


#### **Christmas Fundraising Tea and Sale**
