### From the Rector

There's a remarkable painting that hangs in the north choir aisle of St. Mary's Cathedral in Edinburgh. It's called *The Presence*, and it depicts a scene set in the cathedral itself, where the Eucharist is being distributed in the far distance at the High Altar which is bathed in a diffuse light. Yet in the foreground, half-obscured in the shadows of the nave, we see the figure of a solitary, kneeling, sorrowful person. And behind this kneeling figure is Christ, illuminated in a wholly different kind of light, his hands upraised in a gesture of absolution and

welcome.

The title of the painting refers, of course, to the two presences of Christ. Certainly he is present in the sacramental bread and wine, but he is also—and more significantly—present with the unobserved person forlorn with loneliness, grief and despair. The poignant message of the painting is clear. For whatever reason, the desolate figure is unable to join with the rest of the congregation at the High Altar. And yet this person is not alone.

Perhaps the most surprising way Christ makes himself known is in the lonely, the dispossessed, the forgotten, the wretched, the stranger. One of our strongest impulses is to seek out, and stick with, those who are like us. So we need to be especially vigilant, particularly since the Church's great temptation is to organize itself along party lines, to be a cabal of like-minded, homogeneous folks. As a sort of antidote to this kind of thinking, every Sunday of the year you and I, in the words of the Nicene Creed, profess faith in the catholic Church—"catholic" meaning "universal." We could identify many ways in which the Church is—or at least ought to be—universal, but let's simply say that the Church is universal because it's inclusive. It's open to everyone, and everyone can belong.

And just as, week-in-and-week-out, we profess faith in a universal and inclusive Church, we also pray "Thy kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven." Down through the years, the Church has done all it could to establish a God who reigns in triumph, and to identify itself as a triumphant and victorious special interest group speciously called "ecclesia"—as if those who are called out are somehow special and privileged. And therefore the Church staggers; therefore the Church's statistics decline; therefore the Church is seen as an anachronism; therefore the Church is seen by many as living in contradiction to the values of the

Kingdom.

For only when we have learned to live and love as selflessly as Jesus did will his kingdom come. It will not come through indifference and carelessness, nor will it come to the oblivious and the selfish. It will come through small acts of goodness and charity, by the recognition of the living Lord in every person, and in the strife which seeks to supplant the values of earthly kingdoms with the values of the Kingdom of God.

The painting *The Presence* which seems to caution the Church against an inward-looking piety that prefers ritual splendour to committed compassion. Yes, the real presence is known in bread and wine. But it's also known in your life and mine. And in the life of every person who yearns for a share of his spirit. Seek him. Receive him. Confess him. And then get to work so that his universal kingdom *will* come on earth as it is in heaven.



St. Mark's first rector, the Reverend Robert Addison, arrived in July 1792 with a collection of over 1,500 volumes, which is the oldest library in Ontario. In 1862, Addison's grandsons presented the library "To the Rector of St. Mark's Church, Niagara, And his Successors in perpetuity." Two of the volumes in the Addison Library are manuscripts. One of them, a collection of 18<sup>th</sup> century sermons, has already been published by St. Mark's Archives Committee. The scholars who catalogued the Addison Library said about the other, "One of the most interesting and valuable items that may have been added to Robert Addison's library before his departure for Canada is not a printed book, but a MS (No. 1254) filled with notes on sermons and records of sermons preached from early in 1756 to the end of 1780, kept in a neat 18<sup>th</sup> century hand."

St. Mark's Archives Committee plans to publish the Notebook, as a companion to the 18<sup>th</sup> Century Sermons to make it more available to scholars studying the English Dissenters, and particularly their community in Hackney in the latter half of the eighteenth century. Like the Sermons, the Notebook will be published as a limited edition. Carruthers will print the 188-page text on 70 lb. natural text stock and Van Huizen will complete the volumes with Smyth sewn pages and marble endpapers, bound and trimmed to 8-3/8 x 10-7/8 with calf leather and gold stamped spines.


